We Are Family Mercy: Loosening Our Grip on The Rocks We Hold Tight

John 8:1-11

I. Being quick to pronounce judgment will lead you to do very dark and sinful things.

John 8:3,4 The scribes and the Pharisees brought a woman

who had been caught in adultery, and placing her in the midst ⁴ they said to him, "Teacher, this woman has been caught in the act of adultery.

II. Most people who rush to pick up rocks have an ulterior motive.

John 8:5,6 5"...Now in the Law, Moses commanded us to

stone such women. So what do you say?" ⁶ This they said to test him, that they might have some

charge to bring against him.

5 Reasons We Like to Collect Rocks

- 1. **EASY**—there's a lot to throw rocks at in our dark and fallen world.
- 2. **EVERYBODY's** doing it.
- 3. **EFFECTIVE**—You feel like you're accomplishing something.
- 4. **ENJOYABLE**—You feel better than the person you're stoning. Your sin feels small & insignificant.
- 5. **ESCAPE**—It temporarily takes your sin out of the limelight of your heart and focuses you on the sin of another.

What about <u>you</u>? Are you quick to judge a person or situation? If so, how is this impacting your relationships? Have you ever been judged incorrectly? Have you ever passed wrong judgment on another?

III. Life experience & God's Word both lead us to do one thing: drop the rock.

John 8:9

⁹ But when they heard it, they went away one by one, **beginning with the older ones**, and Jesus was left alone with the woman standing before him.

"I have never met the man I could despair of after discerning what lies in me apart from the grace of God." — **Oswald Chambers**, **My Utmost for His Highest**

IV. Real mercy is given with no strings attached.

John 8:10-11

¹⁰ Jesus stood up and said to her, "Woman, where are they? Has no one condemned you?" ¹¹ She said, "No one, Lord." And Jesus said, "Neither do I condemn you; go, and from now on sin no more."

The mercy Jesus shows the adulterous woman was truly unconditional.

The mercy we show others shouldn't be connected to a specific outcome we desire.

What about *you***?** Do you withhold mercy because you don't know what the results will be in the long run?

V. We all deserve to be stoned...but instead we've received mercy!

Isa. 53:6

⁶ All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned—every one—to his own way; and the LORD has laid on him the iniquity of us all.

Rom. 3:23,24 ²³ for **all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God**, ²⁴ and are justified by his grace as a gift,
through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus,

Mercy triumphs over judgment. ~ James 2:13 ~
