Thriving in Babylon Trusting God through It All Daniel 3:1-30

I. As a Christian You'll Face the Same Kind of Pressures to Assimilate and Bow Down to the Idols of Our Culture Today

Nebuchadnezzar's gold statue wasn't any particular Babylonian god that he wanted them to worship. He understood that his kingdom was filled with people who worshiped all kinds of gods!

We're living in a very pluralistic society today. Pluralism seeks to assimilate you in the public culture by making you privatize your faith and leave God at home.

Sadly, statistics show that Christians here in America are being swallowed up by our culture.

A. Sexual pleasure and expression that has absolutely no restraints

Many Christians have fallen prostrate before this idol looking no different than anyone else in our culture.

In our culture, the idol of sexual pleasure screams constantly that if you don't give into it you'll be left burning in a fiery furnace of frustration. That's a lie because sexual pleasure outside of God's good design is what can destroy you and leave you scarred.

B. Business for profit that is ruthless and has no concern for ethics or marriage and family life at all

If you're a Christian and you decide to be just as ruthless or barely legal to make a living, then you're bowing to the image of our culture.

C. A world of sports that our kids have been thrown into that's no longer about fun but is a multi-billion-dollar industry

Bowing down to this 'Sports Idol' might screw up some of the things that matter most like children seeing a good marriage and having a solid home life where there's margin in the calendar and less stress over finances and schedules.

II. If You Want to Keep Trusting God You'll Need a Theology That's Bigger than "Your Best Life Now"

The theology of God that the 3 young men in this chapter had is captured in v. 17 and 18.

Daniel 3:17-18 "... Our God whom we serve is able to deliver us from the burning fiery furnace, and He will deliver us from your hand, O king. But if not, let it be known to you, O king, that we do not serve your gods, nor will we worship the gold image which you have set up."

Three of the most important and courageous words that demonstrate a theology of trusting God are found right at the start of **v. 18** and they are, "But if not..."

They knew God could deliver them and they were trusting that God would deliver them, but they were saying God may sovereignly choose for His own good purposes to not deliver them.

Throughout the Bible and Church history good, godly men and women who were filled with faith found themselves in circumstances where God didn't deliver them, but allowed them to suffer even unto death.

Hebrews 11:36-38 ""Still others had trial of mockings and scourgings, yes, and of chains and imprisonment. "They were stoned, they were sawn in two, were tempted, were slain with the sword. They wandered about in sheepskins and goatskins, being destitute, afflicted, tormented—"of whom the world was not worthy..."

III. To Embrace a Theology of Suffering You Have to Know the One Who Already Suffered Most for You

There are places in the Old Testament that talk about how 'the angel of the Lord appeared.' That was an appearance of the Jesus Christ before He ever took on flesh and entered into this world.

Daniel 3:25 "Look! I see four men and the fourth is like the Son of God."

If you're a Christian, then go into the furnace of your trials with Jesus Christ, who promised to never leave you or forsake you.

He goes with us into the furnace today, because He went into the ultimate furnace of God's wrath for us alone on the cross! The fiery wrath of God against sin was poured out on Him instead of us!

He's the only One who went through the fire of God's wrath in our place.

No other religion talks like this and no other god can save you like this. That's why Nebuchadnezzar actually spoke very prophetically at the end of **v.29**.

Daniel 3:29b "... there is no other God who can deliver like this."

Unlike Nebuchadnezzar who only spoke about God, Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego made Him their God. They knew Him and were willing to trust and serve Him even if it meant death.
